

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

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

Get Ready Queensland undertook state-wide market research in June 2020 to understand Queenslanders' attitudes about their disaster risk and steps they have taken to prepare.

History shows us that disasters can happen anywhere in Queensland with little warning such as a sudden severe storm that destroys homes, a drought breaking flood or a bushfire.

In the past decade, Queensland has been impacted by more than 80 significant natural disaster events, resulting in tragic loss of life and, and more than \$15 billion in damage to public infrastructure.
