# STORMS

- 1 Storms are usually a combination of wind, rain and hail, which can cause damage to your home.
- 2 Rain can make roads unsafe to drive on. Do not drive in water over the road.
- 3 Get current information about storms from the radio, television, social media or local council disaster web page.
- 4 If you need to leave home, go to a family or friend's house to stay safe. Your council may also have a centre for you to stay in.
- 5 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# FLOODS

- 1 Floods are dangerous because the rising water can injure people as well as damage buildings and cars.
- 2 Floods can be caused by rising rivers, creeks, ocean tides and drains.
- 3 Do not swim or play in flood waters because the water carries rubbish and other dangers.
- 4 Do not drive in flood waters because there are dangers in the water that could damage your car and injure people inside.
- 5 Flood water might damage your home, stop electricity supply, and close roads.
- 6 What else might your family need if you are stuck at home during a flood?
- 7 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# CYCLONES


- 1 Cyclones are a part of life in Queensland's northern coastal areas.
- 2 Cyclones are powerful storms with strong wind and rain that can damage buildings, gardens and roads, and cause flooding.
- 3 Clean-up your yard, pack a kit and have a plan.
- 4 Get current information about cyclones from the radio, television, social media or local council disaster web page.
- 5 Find a safe place in your home to shelter in a cyclone. Small rooms are best. If you need to leave, go to a family or friend's house to stay safe. Your council may also have a centre for you to stay in.
- 6 After a cyclone, there might be fallen trees and powerlines. Be careful outside.
- 7 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# BUSHFIRE

- 1 When the weather is hot and dry, bushfires can start in places like parks and bushland.
- 2 Bushfires can damage homes, businesses or even hurt or kill people.
- 3 Toxic fumes and smoke from bushfires hurt people's eyes and make it hard to breathe.
- 4 Get current information about cyclones from the radio, television, social media or local council disaster web page.
- 5 Have a plan to leave your home early if there is a bushfire warning. Go to a friend's home or a council evacuation centre.
- 6 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# HEATWAVE

- 1** A heatwave is any long period of very hot weather. They are the deadliest natural hazard in Queensland.
- 2** Heatwaves impact anyone but it is important to take special care of:
  - Babies and children, the elderly, people with medical conditions
  - Pets
  - People who work in the outdoors
- 3** In a heatwave:
  - Drink lots of water
  - Stay in the shade and use fans or air-conditioning
  - Wear light clothing, a head and sunscreen
- 4** Understand symptoms of heat sickness:
  - Feeling sick or vomiting
  - Dizzy or weak
  - Fast breathing or short of breath
  - High temperature
  - Red, dry skin
- 5** The number to call if you need emergency health care is “000”
- 6** **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# TSUNAMI

- 1 “Tsunami” is a Japanese word for “harbour wave”. It is several powerful and fast-moving waves.
- 2 Tsunami push water inland, which can damage buildings, vehicles and the environment.
- 3 The chance of tsunami in Queensland is low, but it can happen.
- 4 Get current information from the radio, television, social media or local council disaster web page.
- 5 If a tsunami is coming, quickly go to higher ground, to the top floor of the building or move away from the coast.
- 6 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# EARTHQUAKE

- 1 The shaking from earthquakes can damage buildings and roads, making them unsafe for people and pets.
- 2 Earthquakes can also cause landslides, tsunamis and fires.
- 3 The change of a bad earthquake in Queensland is low, but can happen.
- 4 If a bad earthquake happens and you are inside, take cover under a table and hold on until the shaking stops.
- 5 If a bad earthquake happens and you are outside, stay outside and move away from buildings and power poles.
- 6 Get information from the radio, television, social media or local council disaster web page.
- 7 **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# LANDSLIDE

- ① Landslides are large amounts of dirt, rock or mud sliding out of place that can damage buildings, roads and the environment.
- ② Landslides can happen after heavy rain.
- ③ Signs that a landslide might happen can be:
  - Damage to building walls or cracks in plaster, tiles or bricks
  - Cracks getting bigger in pathways or roads
  - Fences, walls, power poles or trees bending over
- ④ If you think a landslide might happen soon, call “000”.
- ⑤ Leave the area quickly.
- ⑥ **Get ready:** go to your local council or the Get Ready Queensland web pages to find an emergency plan you can do.

# PACK A KIT
